Dear Parishioners,

Paul's first letter to the community at Corinth seeks to respond to several abuses. One significant situation is a haughty display of spiritual gifts that caused the weaker members to feel despised and ostracized from the community. Paul calls upon all the Corinthians to see them joined together as members of one body with a stake in one another's peace and well-being.

There are approximately 1200 households registered at Mary Mother. Eight hundred are active to some degree. Four hundred are absent from weekly Eucharist, have minimal participation in parish activities and offer no financial support. Of course, there are notable exceptions, but the overall pattern holds.

Because we believe we are bound to all registered parishioners, even the inactive, we never drop any person or household unless a request is made.

If you are among the 400 inactive households and have decided to separate from Mary Mother or have already done so, we would appreciate notification. If not, you will continue to be considered our peers and we will consistently invite you to re-join us at the table of the Lord.

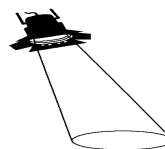

You cannot receive a flu shot you have an acute respiratory illness or fever, an active neurological disorder characterized by changing neurological findings, a history of Guillain-Baree' syndrome (GBS), a severe allergic reaction to eggs, chicken, Thimerosal, vaccine components or latex.

Wear a short sleeve shirt.

Individuals age 9 to 17 require parent or grandparents to be present. Children under 9 years of age must see their pediatrician.

PSR PARKING PROCEDURE

To DROP OFF for PSR: observe ONE WAY direction by **circling the church parking lot** on arrival and letting children in and out of the car on the passenger side at the sidewalk by church doors.

For PICK-UP AFTER PSR: Circle the church lot as usual. **Children will stand inside the Church Vestibule** *awaiting the call of their number, which drivers will display in their windshields.* As you pull forward, our helpers will relay the number to the children who will board their vehicle at the curb. Carefully pull forward once children are in the car.

If you choose not to circle the church lot when picking up your child, you may **park on the South Lot** (to your left as you come up the driveway) by the Parish Activity Center (gym) and **WALK TO THE CHURCH DOORS and wait outside.** Hold your number card so that teachers and your child can see it at the door. Your child will be called to leave with you. Please see to your child's safety by **escorting your child** back to your car. Do not let your children go onto the parking lot or to your car without you.

We appreciate everything you do to keep our children safe!



LITURGY NOTES

Holy Smokes! What's that sound? This fall, as we begin worshipping in our newly-renovated space, we will probably hear a difference in the sound. It is not only **the difference with a new sound system**, but also **the difference created by more hard surfaces** and less carpeting.

Two things happen with sound in a space with hard surfaces. One, **it makes voices (spoken or sung) reverberate** more; and, two, **it increases the presence and sometimes the volume of instruments** (even if they are not amplified).

So, **this presents a challenge** which we will be experiencing over the next several weeks. As we celebrate musical liturgy together each week, there are two elements to consider. First, **our main goal is always to do whatever is possible to support the singing of the Assembly. This is the first priority!** In this type of worship space it is usually easier to hear yourself and others singing. **So, don't hold back! Grab that hymnal and let your voice be heard!**

Secondly, we want to do what we can to **give our Choirs and Musicians the necessary tools to embellish and energize the "work" of the Assembly.** The key is **achieving balance** between the Musicians and the singing Assembly. It will take some time to achieve this balance, so we thank you in advance for your patience!

PARISH NURSE

AED's (automated external defibrillator) are rapidly becoming the unofficial standard care when faced with a sudden cardiac arrest—or SCA. The debate is more about what happens if you don't have an AED rather than if you have one and don't use it properly. An AED is a device about the size of a laptop computer that analyzes the heart's rhythm for abnormalities, and, if necessary, directs the rescuer to deliver an electrical shock to the victim. This shock is called defibrillation and may help the heart to reestablish an effective rhythm of its own.

SCA is usually due to abnormal heart rhythms with the vast majority of these arrhythmias being ventricular fibrillation—V fib. In V fib the heart's electrical impulse is chaotic causing the heart to cease pumping blood effectively. Unless a normal heart rhythm is restored, death will follow within a matter of minutes.

Victims of SCA do not always have a history of heart Disease; and many have no symptoms prior to an arrest. SCA can strike anyone, anytime, anywhere.

In Missouri first responders (first medically trained persons to arrive on the scene, like CPR/AED rescuer) are protected by the Good Samaritan Law. It is vitally important to assist a sudden cardiac arrest person immediately than to do nothing. To date, MMOC has trained about 45 parishioners to act as first responders and there are many other medical parishioners who are trained due to their type and place of work—hospitals, medical offices, clinics, fire and police protection.

AED's are easy to use and will only shock a person whose heart is in an arrhythmia. If you would like to become a first responder, please call the office and talk to Libby or Laura.

Last month I wrote some of the myths concerning immigration, as published by the Missouri Catholic Conference. I will now include more.

Immigrants are a drain on the U.S. economy: During the 1990's, half of all new workers were foreign-born, filling gaps left by native-born workers in both the high and low skill ends of the spectrum. Immigrants fill jobs in key sectors, start their own businesses, and contribute to a thriving economy. The net benefit of immigration to the U.S. is nearly \$10 billion annually. As Alan Greenspan points out, 70% of immigrants arrive in prime working age. That means we haven't spent a penny on their education; yet they are transplanted into our workforce and will contribute \$500 billion towards our social security system over the next 20 years.

Most immigrants cross the border illegally: Around 75% of today's immigrants have legal permanent (immigrant) visas; of the 25% who are undocumented, 40% entered the country legally, but may have overstayed temporary (non-immigrant) visas.

CITIZENS AGAINST PORNOGRAPHY

In August, Citizens Against Pornography along with other concerned individuals and organizations attended a meeting of the County Library Board to voice concern about sexually explicit books being available to youngsters (children as young as 11). It is not the intent of CAP to ban or remove books containing sexually explicit material from the library system. Nor is it CAP's desire to usurp parents' rights to make the material available to their minor children. Unfortunately, many of the books in question have titles, covers and jacket summaries that provide little information about the contents. It is CAP's position that parents need more information if they are to make an informed decision regarding their children's reading material. This is what CAP is asking of the Library Board.

The Library Board held a special workshop in September to consider the concerns raised by CAP and other individuals and groups. It is expected that the Board will announce its decision at its regular October meeting.
