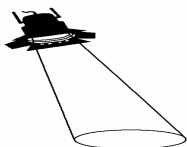
Ed Lewandowski (DRE): PSR is in session; and parents are getting involved.

ADMINISTRATION AND FINANCE COMMISSION*Angie Ness 704-1590*

As reported in the weekly bulletin, there is a shortfall in our Offertory and Major Project Fund. Each year, the Parish Council approves the budget for the parish. This year’s budget was approved while keeping the challenges of the current economy in mind.

Our largest revenue stream comes from the weekly Offertory and Major Project Fund. The Offertory offsets expenses from the parish, while the Major Project Fund helps to repay the church renovation loan from the Archdiocese. The weekly bulletin of October 18, 2009 reported that the Offertory’s year-to-date total is \$21,000 under the budgeted income. The Major Project Fund is \$4,350 under budget year-to-date.

While this is a concern if the parish continues to see these losses, the members of Parish Council have been proactive in cutting expenses. In addition, our Volleyball and Soccer Tournaments have been very profitable. If the members of Mary Mother continue to be active in supporting the parish through our Offertory and Major Project Fund collections, we should still have a productive and faith-filled year. With respect to our families who are struggling to make ends meet, I ask that if possible, you consider increasing your gift to Mary Mother for the next few weeks. God Bless.

TITHING**September 2009 - 4 Sundays**

- 1. St. Anthony Food Pantry, \$800** - Provides direct service to the poor. (Since 1999) (Donating 6 x per year starting 2009)
- 2. St. Augustine Wellston Center, \$800** – Helps support the members of the former five parish communities that merged to become St. Augustine Parish. Services: Food Pantry, Thrift Store, Employment Counseling, Health Services and GED Program. (Since 2005) Twice a year since 2009.
- 3. Catholic Charities, Archdiocese of St. Louis, \$800** - To ease the shortfall created by state reductions in the Medicaid program.
- 4. Harris House, \$400**- Provides residential alcohol and chemical dependency rehabilitation services.
- 5. Institute of Integrated Rural Development (IIRD), \$400** - Supports Fr. Bill Christensen’s work in empowering Bangladesh’s rural poor to end their own poverty (since 2006)
- 6. Resurrection Parish, \$400** - Serves the Vietnamese population. (Since 1999)
- 7. St. Stephen Catholic Church, \$500** - Provides assistance for rural parish in Richwoods (Washington County), MO. Parish serves a very poor area of the state and barely keeps its door open. (Since 2007)
- 8. Interfaith Committee on Latin America, \$400** - Provides charity and advocacy for the poor in Latin America. (Since 1998)
- 9. Blood of Christ parish in La Paz Bolivia, \$900** - Provides missionary presence in the rural area of La Paz. Sangre de Cristo is one of the many priest less missions in Bolivia.
