January minutes were approved and seconded with the amended statement, "MaryAnn also mentioned the Mouse Races raised **\$2182** and the soccer camp brought in \$1649."

Old Business:

Nominations

Randy reported that 19 parishioners (adult and youth) attended the Night of Discernment. Five adult parishioners and one youth agreed to run for Parish Council. Since that was the number needed to fill the positions, no election was necessary. The new adult members to the Parish Council are Mike Cibulka, Lori Fick, Judy Reuter, Glenn Waeckerle and Ron Werner. The youth chairperson will be Kelsey Riebeling.

Mary Mother Pictorial Directory

Susan reported that Bob Hughes and Fred Hohenberger have volunteered to chair this project.

Major Fund Raiser

Susan is getting prices from caterers for the dinner/dance to be held on April 10. It was decided that the cost of admission would be \$75/person for a regular table and \$100 for a "special" table.

New Business:

Parish Council Meeting-Time Change

Lisa suggested that the Council consider changing the monthly meeting time from 7:30 p.m. to 7:00 p.m. The motion was approved and seconded. The new time will take effect with the March meeting.

Archdiocesan Catholic Women's Recognition Award

Lisa received a letter from the archdiocese in reference to this year's Archdiocesan Women's Recognition Awards Celebration. This year they are hoping to honor one woman from each of our 180 parishes in the category of "Artist."

Selections must be submitted by June 14.

Stewardship Workshop Feedback

Lisa asked for any feedback from those who attended the Archdiocesan Stewardship Workshops. All who attended said it had been very informative and worthwhile. We will continue to pursue this in our own parish.

Ad/Fin: Fr. T reported that we had an audit, which indicated our strengths and weaknesses. Deacon will meet with the archdiocese in regard to a program called Shared Accounting. Forty-two parishes already participate.

Health Ministry: Craig reported that we had 43 donors at our parish blood drive!

Christian Service: Kim Blackford reported that the Sandwich Shop was doing well. Healthy Communities Retreat will be held on March 6 at Mary Mother.

Christian Formation: Pat reported that there was a very good response to the 6 and 8 week Bible study programs.

Social: Susan reported that the first fish fry netted \$2100! The second fish fry is March 5. The Frozen Tundra golf outing made \$280 with 16 golfers attending.

DRE: Ed mentioned that the ALPHA program would be inviting the next generation of parishioners, parents with school-age children. They hope to have child care available so parents can have an "evening out." First Communion will be April 25 and Confirmation on May 13.

Comments from Pastor

Before the meeting ended, Lisa suggested that the new Parish Council put as a **first-meeting** agenda item a discussion and amendment to the current by-laws which would set an attendance policy, i.e. the number of meetings a member may be absent per year and still be allowed to serve on the Parish Council.

Sun Protection

With warmer weather here, we tend to spend more time outside and in the sun. To enjoy the sun without causing skin damage, here are some points to follow:

Babies younger than 6 months of age, should be kept out of direct sunlight.

Sunscreen should have an SPF of at least 30. For very young children an SPF of 45 is advisable.

Sunscreen should not be negotiable for children. If you encounter resistance from your child, let him/her help in applying the sunscreen.

Sunscreen should be applied to all exposed skin thirty minutes prior to going outside. Don't forget your lips – use a SPF lip balm for outdoors.

Children and adults should all wear a wide-brimmed hat and sunglasses when in the sun.

Try to avoid direct sunlight between the hours of 10a.m. and 4p.m. Most skin damage occurs before the age of 20 and usually from severe sunburns.

If you or your child sustains a burn, treat with oral fluids, bath in tepid water, and apply a skin moisturizer.

LITURGY NOTES

Did you ever wonder why we use the word “liturgy” for our community celebrations. There's a reason why certain gatherings in our Catholic tradition are called by that name. The word itself comes from the **Greek *leitourgia*** which meant the performance of a public duty, i.e., a service undertaken by a citizen for the sake of the state. In today's Church, **liturgy means “a work of the people.”** It is something we undertake, as a group, for the sake of our community. **The group aspect of celebrating liturgy is very important to its function.** Because the Mass serves as the **“source and summit” of our community's spiritual life,** it is essential that we undertake this activity as a group -- **- that's why it's so wonderful to have such strong participation at Mass here at Mary Mother.**

Architects often say they design a building so that: **“form follows function.”** That is, a building's design is determined by the reason the building is being built. In a similar way, **the form of a certain liturgy is determined by the reason a group of believers is gathering together.** In addition to the Mass, there are special liturgies for Holy Week, liturgies associated with the Sacraments, liturgies for dedications, commemorations, and anniversaries. There are even liturgies for morning prayer and evening prayer. **Hopefully you have experienced some of these liturgies during the Easter Season.**

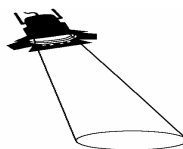

Services include support groups, transportation, health and safety issues, and many other areas backed by hundreds of volunteers and our Parish Nurses.

God has blessed us with all of these people and we pray that he continues to bless all those in our commission as well as all of you!

TITHING**March 2009 (4 Sundays)**

- 1. SVdP/dba St. Anthony Food Pantry**, \$800 - Provides direct service to the poor. (Donating 6 x per year starting 2009)
- 2. Women's Safe House**, \$800 – Helps victims of abuse and their children with shelter, counseling, and legal services. (Since 1997)
- 3. Birthright Counseling, St. Louis**, \$800– Supports the Heaven and Earth program which sponsors an expectant mother through her pregnancy and beyond.
- 4. Wings of Hope**, \$600– Uses private aviation to deliver health care, educational assistance, and other humanitarian services to the poor in poorly accessible areas throughout the United States and the world.
- 5. Covenant House**, \$500 – Provides food, shelter, clothing, counseling, and legal assistance to homeless and at risk children in the St. Louis area. Served over 3500 children in 2008. (Since 1997)
- 6. Fr. Quinn's Mission**, \$500 – Works with the poor in Playa del Carmen, Mexico. (Since 1997)
- 7. Catholic Education Office: Grant-Loan Tuition Assistance Program**, \$800– Provides grants and loans to help students complete their Catholic high school education. (since 2007)
- 8. Catholic Relief Services**, \$800 - Direct aid for the survivors of the Chilean earthquake.
- 9. United Assembly Church of God**, \$ 400 - Supports a Learning Center to facilitate the education of Jamaican youth. (New 2010)

TITHING**April 2010 (4 Sundays)**

- 1. Our Lady of Guadalupe**, \$800– Provides prenatal and infant care through the parish nurse program. (Quarterly contribution)
- 2. St. Augustine Wellston Center**, \$800 – Helps support the members of the former five parish communities that merged to become St. Augustine Parish. Services: Food Pantry, Thrift Store, Employment Counseling, Health Services and GED Program. Twice a year. (Since 2005)
- 3. Habitat for Humanity**, \$800 – Habitat for Humanity offers a homeownership opportunity to families unable to obtain conventional house financing - generally, those whose income is 30 to 50 percent of the area's median income. Habitat houses are built using donations of land, material and labor. Mortgage payments are kept affordable. (Since 2005)
- 4. Karen House**, \$800 – Provides shelter for women and their children as they break free of abusive situations. Always full with 13 women and 15-20 children, they respond to 20-30 calls for shelter a day.
- 5. Rural Parish Workers of Christ the King**, \$800 - Provides basic services and assistance to the poor of Washington County, Missouri, in the form of food, clothing, and shelter. (Since 1997)
- 6. English Tutoring Project**, \$500 – Supports the teaching of English to children from immigrant and refugee families at four Catholic elementary schools in the city, St. John the Baptist, St. Cecilia School, St. Frances Cabrini Academy, and Immaculate Heart of Mary. Since 2002
- 7. Interfaith Legal Services for Immigrants**, \$500 - Helps immigrants become full contributing members of our society. (Since 2003)
- 8. Criminal Justice Ministry, Society of St. Vincent DePaul**, \$500 – Assists in the ministry to those incarcerated, to help their families during the confinement and to provide transitional aid upon release. (Since 2003)
- 9. Mary, Mother Emergency Fund**, \$500

So, here is a thumb-nail sketch. We are part of a Foundation named Gamaliel, out of Chicago. We have members throughout the United States, Great Britain and South Africa. We are a faith-based, grassroots organization, multi-denominational organization that works on Social Justice. Our focus is on Work Force Development, Immigration, Transportation, Education, Health Care Reform and all Pro-Life issues. We also strive to develop and deepen relationships through one on ones, with members of our own Faith Community.

MCU trains leaders who then become Community Organizers (either paid or volunteer) who organize people and money. The issue we worked on most recently was getting Prop A passed, and we did.
